What is the Problem?

- Increasing numbers of animals in county shelters
- Animal shelters are over capacity
- Volunteer and foster care system is overburdened
- The current system isn't meeting the needs of animals, volunteers, staff or the community



What are the Causes?

Too many unwanted dogs & cats

- Unaltered animals reproducing
 - Shelters are safety net for unwanted animals
 - Foster care for injured, nursing and underage offspring, other special needs



- Owners don't redeem
- Owners relinquish animals
 - Unable or unwilling to provide care




Too few homes to adopt them

Adoption rates are below need




County Animal Shelter Trends

Dog Intake SB County Animal Shelters 2003-04 through 2008-09




Outcomes for Dogs

Dog Outcome Trends by Percent




Cat Intake SB County Animal Shelters 2003-04 through 2008-09



Outcomes for Cats



Thousands of Cats & Kittens Come into the County Shelters Every Year




Hundreds of foster homes provide needed care

What are the Consequences?

Poor outcomes for animals

- Longer shelter stays, warehousing
- Increased potential for behavior problems
- Stress, illness, disease
- Lowered adoptability of pets
- Ongoing need for euthanasia

Poor outcomes for residents

- Increased costs
- Stress for employees and visitors





What is the Solution?

- Reducing the number of unwanted animals
 - Responsible Pet Owner Ordinance
 - Provide access to spay-neuter services
 - Promote spay-neuter clinics
 - Provide subsidies for low-income residents
 - Utilize incentives
 - Phase in the program to assist pet owners

What is the Solution?

- Implement Responsible Pet Ownership Program
 - Provide outreach and education
 - Licensing and spay-neuter, "your pet's ticket home"
 - Increase pet licensing
 - Increase return to owner rate
 - License fees support animal shelter system

Key Points from Dr. Ron Faoro

- 70% of animals in shelter are strays
- Almost all strays are not spayed or neutered

Responsible Pet Owners

 Responsible owners take their pet to the veterinarian

- Veterinary Certificate for unaltered dogs and cats
 - Owners may have an intact dog or cat with a Veterinary Certificate to purchase an Unaltered Animal License.
 - Owners without a Veterinary Certificate shall spay or neuter their dog/cat.
 - \$10 surcharge for each Unaltered Animal License will provide spay and neuter subsidies and support

- Owners do not qualify for Unaltered Animal License in specific circumstances:
 - Owners convicted for crimes against animals or domestic violence.
 - Dog or cat impounded and/or cited at large three times within a year.
 - Dog whose owner has been found guilty of allowing dog to run free resulting in injury to human or animal.

- Unaltered Cats
 - Veterinary Certificate required for unaltered cats
 - Require license for cats
 - Yearly fee for unaltered cats
 - One time fee for altered cats
 - Free lifetime license for cats which are altered and microchipped

- Transfer of Dogs and Cats
 - Provide new owner with access to health records and ordinance
 - Display Unaltered Animal License when advertising the Transfer of an animal

Principles Guiding Ordinance Approach

- Support responsible pet ownership
- Reduce the number of unwanted animals
- Decisions should be made between the owner and their veterinarian
- Minimize fiscal impacts

Implementation Strategy

- Phase in
 - Implementation would occur during normal license cycle for already licensed animals
- 6 month free license for new licenses
- Rabies clinics throughout the County
- Electronic system to make it simple and easy

Enforcement

- Enforcement complaint-driven or related to other violations
- No "pet patrol"
- No additional enforcement staff





Responsible Pet Ownership Program

- Modeled after program in Calgary, Canada
- Promotes responsible pet ownership by increasing:
 - Outreach and education
 - Licensed pets
 - Pets returned to owners
 - Fiscal viability of Animal Services
- Spay-Neuter subsidies
- Media outreach
- Incentives for compliance
- Consequences "Fix It" Ticket

Responsible Pet Ownership Program

- Positive approach to increase licensing
- Staffing throughout the County for education/outreach
 - Funded by one-time revenues
 - Self-supporting with increased license revenue within 2-3 years
- Amnesty period
- Leverage compliance with penalty
 - Amend fee schedule to include \$250 penalty for unlicensed dog/cat

Unique Approach

Responsible Pet Owner Ordinance

- Spay-neuter is not required
- Considering pet's breeding potential in consultation with a veterinarian is required

Responsible Pet Ownership Program

- Compliments the ordinance
- Provides info to residents on key issues:
 - Responsible pet ownership
 - Importance of animal licensing
 - Benefits of spaying-neutering pets
 - Spay-Neuter resources in our communities

Volunteers are Fantastic Still there is the issue of high numbers of animals coming in
